Why do we need quality assurance?

- Safety of all participants
- Ensuring principles of restorative practice are upheld as practice expands— eg around voluntarism, neutrality, equality of all participants etc
- Ensuring the strong benefits found in research are replicated not watered down
- Public and Commissioner Confidence in RP
- Professional status for practitioners/services



What's in place already in England and Wales?

- RJC Principles of Restorative Justice 2004
- Home Office *Best Practice Guidance for restorative practitioners* – 2004 – currently under review
- RJC Trainers Code of Practice 2006 2010 version out for consultation
- National Occupational Standards 2010
- City and Guilds diploma in restorative practice



National Occupational Standards and the Diploma

- City and Guilds Diploma made up of four mandatory plus one optional unit
- Diploma currently being piloted in Kent, Thames Valley, Norfolk and the South West – but live and open to all
- Units and diploma designed to work across all fields pilot includes schools, police, prisons, probation, panel members, YOT workers etc
