

Faced Many Uncertainties

- Continual changes in school leadership and school funding levels.
- Lost AmeriCorps funding when national association folded.
- Paid staff so little they should have left for better jobs, but none did!
- Funding never guaranteed at any level from year to year.



Five Year Summary of CMRJI Case and Student Participation Data








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Five Year Student Participation by Gender






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Five Year Data Student Participation by Grade






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
Five Year Student Participation by Ethnicity




Five Year Adult Participation








My Child Learned New Ways of Resolving Disputes








Fostering a Sense of Connectedness













You are providing a safe place for people to resolve conflicts. You are not resolving conflicts for them.


Be the peaceful presence at the center of the safe space.

Don't let fear get in the way. It manifests in strange ways, but it's still weaker than peace.





You can't explain RJ
—Engage people in activities to help them FEEL it to understand.



Take time to define your objective and scope.


Capitalize on practitioners' talents and don't get stuck on process, style or top-down control.





Keep careful data (both quantitative and qualitative) in a format you can access for variety of reports.

Seek opportunities to tell stories about RJ's impact—in participants' own words whenever possible.











