# Purpose




To provide an opportunity for the parties involved to talk about the incident, how they have been affected, and to negotiate a resolution that addresses the harm caused.

To resolve some minor offences outside the formal court process.





# Diversion from the Criminal Court Process





### Who Qualifies?



- Adults (18+) charged with less serious offences
- Limited or no prior involvement in the adult court system
- Referred by the Crown Attorney (prosecutor)
- Accepts responsibility for the offence
- Willing to meet with mediators and person harmed (victim)
- Prepared to make amends for any harm caused



#### Benefits for the Victim



- Meaningful involvement in the resolution
- Active participation and understanding what happened and why
- Opportunity to describe impact of the harm
- Restore a sense of control and orderliness; closure and healing



#### Benefits for the Accused



- Awareness of how offences caused harm to victim and others
- Full participation in a fair and reasonable resolution
- Takes ownership and responsibility
- "Makes it right" with the person harmed and repairs the harm caused
- No criminal conviction registered



## Benefits to the Community



- Restorative Justice approach:
  - An opportunity to build a sense of community
  - Addresses victim needs and offender responsibility in repairing the harm
- Reduced court/police costs by fewer court appearances and no criminal trial
- Involvement of community members in an effort to put things right



#### The Process



- 1. Coordinator's assessment with accused at court
- 2. Coordinator's first contact with victim
- 3. Selection of volunteer mediators
- 4. Case development with accused
- 5. Case development with victim
- 6. Mediation between the parties leading to mutual agreement



## **Operational Considerations**



- Communications about the program and gaining the support of stakeholders in the court.
- Scheduling and logistical issues
- Negotiating the expectations of participants
- Supporting victim participation



#### **Case Considerations**



- Participants have pre-existing relationships
- The incident caused harm to both parties
- Being sensitive to victim's fears or concerns re incident and confronting the accused
- Supporting participants with unresolved feelings about the incident
- Being sensitive to participant's cultural or religious backgrounds
- Considering more serious cases for the program
- Including additional support people in the mediation
